AAUW History

AAUW's story begins in 1881, when a small group of female college graduates banded together to open the doors for women's career advancement and to encourage more women to pursue higher education.

AAUW have published hundreds of research reports, from an 1885 paper disproving a prevailing myth that college impairs a woman's fertility to, most recently, a study documenting the economic impact of workplace sexual harassment. The organization has supported the academic achievements of many thousands of scholars, from scientist Marie Curie, the first woman to win a Nobel Peace Prize, to astronaut Judith Resnik, the second woman in travel in space.

The advocacy efforts have propelled countless new laws, including the Equal Pay Act, first proposed in 1945 and finally passed in 1963; the Title IX amendment in 1972; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act in 2009; and the Paycheck Fairness Act, which was passed by both U.S. Representatives and U.S. Senate and signed by the President of United States in 2019. Herlinda was also instrumental in bringing LBCC classes to the Carmelitos housing development, the largest subsidized public housing in the Long Beach City College District.

In addition to her leadership in education, Herlinda has served on several boards and commissions including the Long Beach City College's Housing Selection Panel, Long Beach City College Basic Needs Task Force (assisting students in need), Conservation Corps of



Long Beach Advisory Board, the citywide Latino Economic Impact Study working group headed by Cal State Long Beach, Long Beach Parks and Recreation Commission, Co-Chair of the Mayor's Animal Care and Visioning Task Force, Chair of the Watershed Conservation Authority and Executive Board Member of the Gateway Cities Council of Governments to name just a few.

Herlinda attended Rio Hondo Community College and transferred to California State University, San Bernardino where she was President of the speech and debate team and earned a Bachelor's degree in Communications. Herlinda is a third-generation public servant and has 20 years of legislative and public affairs experience. She currently works for Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn as Field Deputy representing Long Beach, Signal Hill, and Catalina Island and also advises on education policy and labor relations as part of her portfolio.

Herlinda has been recognized for her dedicated community service by several Long Beach organizations including the Long Beach Branch NAACP President's Award, Long Beach Gay and Lesbian Pride Whitey Littlefield Bridge Builder Award and parade grand marshal, Centro Cha's Excellence in Community Service award and the Cambodian Association of America's Outstanding Public Service award.

I consider myself Italian by heart, French by mind and American by action.

I was born and raised in an Italian family in Paris. Fully bilingual, I attended an Italian high school, and a French university. With a PhD in molecular biology and virology from the University Denis-Diderot-Paris, I settled in the US as a postdoctoral scientist in 1990, and spent five years at the National institutes of Health (NIH) followed by two years at the Food & Drug Administration (FDA), in Bethesda, MD. At the time, my work focused on yeast genetics and the molecular virology of a yeast virus first, and then on dengue virus, a mosquito-borne virus that causes hemorrhagic fever in humans.

I was then recruited in a biotech startup, located in the Bay Area (CA) and dedicated to the development of novel blood-based biomarkers for the early detection and management of major cancers. I joined the company 20+ years ago, at inception, and as the company remained small, I was able to wear many different hats, thus contributing to multiple aspects of biotech development. I first worked as Senior Scientist in the technology development team, then shifted gears and became part of the executive team. As such, I supervised operations, handled academic collaborations, and carried out a variety of functions from science management to intellectual property and regulatory affairs.



I joined the AAUW-San Francisco Branch eager to contribute to Tech Trek in 2018, and became Secretary last year. Because of my strong interest in promoting STEM education, this year I launched a new program around the Tech Trek alumnae to support them in their exploration of STEM disciplines through the middle and high school years, and into their transition to college. As part of this new program, we held our first event in January: "Women in STEM: A Career Panel". My goal is to expand this program not only to hold more events during the year but also to partner with neighboring branches in the Bay Area.

At the community level, I lead a beautification project in the San Francisco neighborhood I live in, which consists in the improvement of a 186-step staircase, called the Detroit Steps, with infrastructure, lighting, landscaping and tiling.

As a working mom, I raised a multicultural family, bridging cultural differences in my own household. The cookbook I am writing is a celebration of that. Indeed, food is the most fundamental expression of cultural identity, and the food is also a universal denominator across cultures. Most often, it is around a meal that cultural differences can be understood, and cultural diversity embraced.
