AAUW mourns the passing of Lilly Ledbetter, the inspiring warrior for equal pay who epitomized the grit and persistence we need to meet our mission. Her long-running and trailblazing challenge of *Goodyear Tire & Rubber* for pay discrimination went to the Supreme Court and finally to President Obama's desk for passage into law as the *Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009*. Some died along the way and were given a proper burial. We won't sing *Taps* for them, because that would be punishing to your ears, but we will sing the praises of our state lobbying efforts for this success.
