The Department of Justice (DOJ)'s new Title VI "merit" rule eliminates disparate-impact protections, making it harder to challenge "neutral" policies that consistently harm communities of color, women and girls of color, immigrants, and disabled students. At the same time, the administration is hollowing out the U.S. Department of Education, scattering key K–12 and higher-education programs across other agencies and raising serious questions about how students' rights will be enforced. Urge robust congressional oversight of DOJ's civil-rights rollback and the efforts to gut the Department of Education by signing up for the AAUW Action Network [HERE](#).
  3. This year marks 50 years of AAUW members in the Washington, D.C. area engaging in volunteer advocacy as the Capitol Lobby Corps. Every month, they visit offices on Capitol Hill to discuss and educate legislators and their staff about AAUW's key issues. We are grateful for their impactful congressional outreach and dedication to advancing AAUW's mission.

***On Tyranny: Twenty Lessons from the Twentieth Century* by Timothy Snyder (2017).**

Recommended by Amy Hom, AAUW California Director & Public Policy Co-chair.

- Amy explains this book “is a short, accessible, and timely read. Snyder, a historian of Central and Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union, and the Holocaust, distills essential lessons from 20th-century history to show how Americans can safeguard democratic freedoms and fight back against rising autocracy.”
- Amy recommends this book because it “offers practical guidance for both individual and collective resistance to the looming threat of authoritarianism.”

***This is How It Always Is* by Laurie Frankel (2017).**

- Describing the book, Claudia explains, “The author writes articulately about the challenges related to raising and honoring a child's choice, the impacts of the transgender person on family members, and the challenges around having close family friends. While not an autobiographical story, the author says that the book draws heavily on her personal experiences.”
  - Claudia recommends this book because “this is a beautifully written book that helped me better understand the transgender person, their perspective, and the impacts on family dynamics. Each family member has their own individual issues and flaws that the author takes time to describe and develop. This character development lays the foundation to expand on how each person, in their own way, loves and protects the uniqueness of the youngest child who doesn't know if s/he wants to be male or female.”
