

## Money Trek Presenter Recommendations

- Know your audience and based on that, select the modules and slides you want to present.
- Do not underestimate the students; age is not the only criteria. Find out their level of understanding and interest.
- Begin with an icebreaker such as handing out <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of a cookie or a pink dollar bill worth 77 cents to drive the point home about wage gap.
- Get feedback from the students in the beginning and at the end. In the beginning, try to get a feeling of what they know and at the end, find out how much they learned.
- Interact with your audience to make them at ease, but don't let the presentation become too informal.
- Sum up with short conclusions and compare with students' ideas of what is important in each section.
- Become familiar with the location of the workshop, parking space, etc.. Check for Internet access and go online in advance to demo some of the workbook activities.
- The presentation should be for an hour and a half to two hours. Combine modules one and two, three and four and five and six as they are related subjects and it will make the concepts clear.
- Have fun and make it fun for the students.
