"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any educational program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Title IX: More Than Sports

All areas of education, including:

- · Recruitment, admissions, and housing
- Comparable facilities
- Access to course offerings
- Financial assistance
- Student health services & insurance benefits
- Athletics
- Hiring, retention, and promotion

Title IX: More Than Schools

Applies to institutions receiving federal funds, including:

- Local school districts
- Colleges and universities
- For profit schools
- · Career and technical education programs
- Libraries and museums

Title IX: More Than Students

Protects everyone who interacts with a school, including:

- Students
- Parents and guardians
- Applicants
- For profit schools
- Teachers and faculty
- School staff

Title IX: Big Changes

- Expanded definition of "sex-based harassment"
- Includes discrimination of the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity
- Robust protections for pregnant and parenting students and employees

Title IX: Expanded Definitions

"Sex-based harassment"

- Hostile environment harassment
- Sexual assault
- Dating violence
- Domestic violence
- Stalking

Title IX: Clarifying Inclusion

Includes discrimination of the basis of:

- Sex stereotypes
- Sex characteristics
- Pregnancy & related conditions
- Sexual orientation
- Gender identity

Title IX: Gender Identity

"Adopting a policy or engaging in a practice that prevents a person from participating in an education program or activity consistent with the person's gender identity subjects a person to more than de minimis harm on the basis of sex."

§ 106.31, Final Rule pg. 1524

Title IX: Pregnancy

Pregnancy and Related Conditions

- · Proactive information provided to students
- Cannot fundamentally alter education program or require documentation
- Lactation space
- Voluntary leaves of absence
- Comparable treatment to other medical conditions for employees

Title IX: Additional Details

- Effective and enforceable August 1, 2024
- New regulations 65% changed from 2020
- Restores discretion & flexibility on process
- Broadens jurisdiction over conduct
- · More flexibility for in grievance processes
- Training requirements
- · New confidentiality rules

Title IX: Challenges Ahead










- Held four Fund Peer Group meetings.

Expenses to Date \$148,174

- Office manager, storage, supplies: \$30,688 (20.7%)
- Public Policy: \$53,824 (36.3%)
- Travel primarily Committee Day \$32,007 (21.6%)
- Software and website \$12,829 (8.7%)
- Finance, CPA, tax filings \$8448 (5.7%)
- Membership consultant and advertising \$7483 (5.1%)
- Gov Trek startup support \$1000 (0.7%)
- Shipping, expenses to be invoiced, misc \$1895 (1.3)





- State finance is tracking to budget and should meet the approved budget for FYE 6/30/2024. The budget included the use of reserves for an in-person Committee Day, support for Gov Trek and Membership initiatives. This impacted our cash balances as of 3/3/2024.
- Balances for cash and the Operating, Project and General reserve accounts well exceed policy minimum requirements. Investments returns, up over last year, fully offset the decrease in cash balances.
- Membership dues revenues have decreased over the prior year while expenses increased, but there is no current need to increase state dues.
 This will continue to be evaluated for future years.





Standardized Tech Trek camp accounting system using QuickBooks Online (QBO)

- Piloted in 2023
- Full rollout in 2024
- 2024 training and implementation for all camp treasurers
- All Tech Trek camp transactions and branch balances can now be captured and reported
- Accessible by camp treasurers, camp directors, and Tech Trek leadership





Held Finance Peer Group sessions branch treasurers and other branch leaders.

- AAUW Resources: Showed how to access resources on the AAUW California website including government forms, instructions, and websites.
- Government Filings: Covered standard filings as well as issues such as sales tax and raffles.
- How to be a Branch Treasurer Beyond the basics: Covered topics such as sales tax requirements, 1099 reporting, budgeting etc.
- What's All the HUB About? Covered the use of the HUB for all topics related to membership dues including adding and renewing members, how to use Shape the Future discounts etc.

- Created C/U Peer Group first meeting May 9th






Leadership Development

AAUW California Legislative Agenda: 2023 Scorecard & 2024 Bill

- Out of 22 supported bills that made it to the Governor's desk, 19 were signed into law, making our success rate 86.3%
- AAUW California is authoring a bill, AB 2843
 - O Seeks to eliminate cost-sharing for rape survivors who seek medical care following their assault.
 - O Inspired by Kathi Harper, who saw an Op Ed in the LA Times and was motivated to take action.





- Public Policy News: The colorful monthly newsletter is sent to all branch presidents, public policy chairs and newsletter editors to provide them with information about and links to public policy events, news, activities, and opportunities to engage.
- School Board Project: AAUW California branch members are attending school board meetings and building coalitions in an effort to protect and defend public education from regressive actions.
- Website Facelift: The new site is much more engaging and navigable, and the aesthetic is appealing to a wider audience.






- Held Governance Peer Group meetings to inform and instruct branch leaders on how to update their bylaws to include mandatory changes.




Superior Court of California County of San Diego Community Outreach and Education Program








Some Judicial Demographic information that was presented:
